



## ACADEMIC LEADERSHIP PROGRAM RECIPIENTS

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Indiana University Bloomington has selected six faculty members to serve as 2023-24 fellows for the Academic Leadership Program (ALP), which helps develop leadership skills of professors who may pursue careers in academic administration.

The program is sponsored by the Big 10 Academic Alliance (formerly the Committee on Institutional Cooperation, or CIC), made up of the 14 universities in the Big Ten conference and the University of Chicago. All participants selected from the member universities will participate in three seminars hosted by Big 10 Academic Alliance universities and will take part in campus-based meetings and programs with administrative leaders.

### David Crandall

David Crandall is the Luddy Professor of Computer Science and Inaugural Director of the Luddy Artificial Intelligence Center in the Luddy School of Informatics, Computing, and Engineering at Indiana University. He obtained the Ph.D. in Computer Science from Cornell University in 2008, and was a Postdoctoral Research Associate at Cornell from 2008-2010. He received the B.S. and M.S. degrees in Computer Science and Engineering from the Pennsylvania State University State University, and was a Senior Research Scientist at Eastman Kodak Company from 2001-2003. Since joining IU in 2010, he has been PI or Co-PI on almost \$30 million in research funding (\$12 million as PI). He has published over 200 technical articles in top international venues, and has received best paper awards or nominations in CVPR, WWW, CHI, ICCV, and ICDL. He is an Associate Editor of the *IEEE Transactions on Pattern Analysis and Machine Intelligence* and the *IEEE Transactions on Multimedia*, has been an Area Chair for major conferences including CVPR, ICCV, ECCV, WACV, AAAI, ICML, NeurIPS, and IJCAI, and Program Chair for WACV 2023 and CVPR 2024. He has received an NSF CAREER award (2013), two Google Faculty Research Awards (2014 and 2020), an IU Trustees Teaching Award (2017), a Grant Thornton Fellowship (2019), a Luddy Professorship (2021), and Distinguished ACM Membership (2022).



### Rich Hardy

Rich Hardy is Provost Professor of Biology and Associate Dean for Undergraduate Education in the College of Arts and Sciences. He received his B.Sc. from Newcastle University (U.K.), his Ph.D. from UAB, and was a post-doctoral fellow with Nobel Laureate Charles Rice at Washington University in St. Louis prior to joining IU in 2002. His research, funded by the NIH and NSF, focuses on mosquito-transmitted viruses with an emphasis on understanding the molecular requirements for efficient virus replication in both the mosquito and vertebrate hosts. He is also Director of the Arts + Sciences Undergraduate Research Experience program. ASURE gives students chance to do meaningful research during their first year in college. ASURE launched in 2018 with a student cohort of 80 students and in 2022, there were nearly 400 student participants. Since arriving at IU he has won the Trustees Teaching Award five times, has served as Director of the Human Biology Program, was Chair of the High Impact Experiences for All Undergraduates working group of the IU2030 Strategic Plan, and is currently a member of the Student Affairs Committee of the Bloomington Faculty Council.



### Caroline Chick Jarrold

Caroline Chick Jarrold is Class of 1948 Herman B Wells Endowed Professor and Associate Dean for Research and Mathematical & Natural Sciences in the College of Arts and Sciences. She received her B.S. in Chemistry at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, in 1989, and her Ph.D. in Physical Chemistry from the University of California, Berkeley, in 1994. After being a University of California President's Postdoctoral Fellow at UCLA, she joined the Chemistry faculty at the University of Illinois, Chicago in 1997, and was there until her move to the Indiana University Chemistry Department in 2002.



Her research involves applying a combination of gas-phase reactivity, mass spectrometry, anion photodetachment spectroscopies, and computational chemistry toward issues of importance in energy and environment.

### Linda Pisano

Linda Pisano has served as Chair of Department of Theatre, Drama, and Contemporary Dance since August 2018. She heads the MFA in Costume Design and directed Theatre and Dance's Design & Technology area from 2014-2018. She directs the Theatre and Dance [Study Abroad Program in London](#) since 2004. She has served two terms as an elected member of the Board of Directors for the United States Institute for Theatre Technology and served in several national capacities in her profession. At IU she has served in many capacities including the BFC.

A member of the United Scenic Artists Local 829, Linda's professional designs include a broad range of theatre, dance, musical theatre, ballet, and opera and have been featured on stages throughout the United States, Canada, and the UK. Her work has been featured in the Quadrennial World Design Expo in Prague, the Bakhrushin Museum in Moscow, the China Institute of Stage Design in Beijing, and the World Stage Design exhibition in Taipei and Toronto. She is a four-time winner of the Peggy Ezekiel Award for Excellence in Design, a three-time jury winner in the National Design Expo, and a two-time recipient of the Kennedy Center /ACTF Meritorious Achievement in Costume Design Award. She has received grants and fellowships for historic costume and Venice/Florence based research for Commedia dell'arte masks construction and history.



### Josh Perry

Josh Perry is Associate Dean for Academics and Graf Family Professor of Business Law & Ethics at the Kelley School of Business at Indiana University Bloomington. He previously served as faculty chair of the Undergraduate Program and chair of the Department of Business Law & Ethics. He has been a key leader in Kelley's diversity and inclusion efforts, mental wellness programming, and ethical leadership development.

He joined Kelley in 2009 and has won many awards for teaching, including the IU Trustees' Teaching Award and Kelley's Innovative Teaching Award. He is an elected member of IU's Faculty Academy on Excellence in Teaching, and has served Indiana University on many advisory boards, task forces, and committees. He also teaches ethics courses at Albany Medical College in New York and Aix-Marseille Graduate School of Management in France.

His award-winning research has appeared in many leading law reviews and peer-reviewed journals across the fields of business, medicine, law, and ethics. He formerly served as law and public policy section editor for the *Journal of Business Ethics* and staff editor for the *American Business Law Journal*. Dean Perry earned his law degree and his master's degree in theological studies with a concentration in ethics from Vanderbilt University, and his bachelor's degree from Lipscomb University. Before joining Kelley, he was on faculty at the Center for Biomedical Ethics and Society at Vanderbilt, where he taught in the medical school and law school.



## Colleen Ryan

Colleen Ryan is Professor of Italian and Associate Vice Provost for Faculty and Academic Affairs at Indiana University. She oversees the Initiative for the Advancement of Women and is liaison to the Institute for Advanced Study's mid-career mentorship program. Colleen Ryan's research spans various aspects of gender and sexuality studies in Italian cinema and literature, Italian diaspora and ethnicity studies, the teaching of foreign languages through the arts, and professional and curriculum development. Over the years, Ryan has taught an array of courses on Italian literature and film, gender and sexuality studies, Italian-American culture, and foreign language pedagogy and career development. She has served as Director of Language Instruction and Director of Undergraduate Studies for Italian, won an American Association of University Women Faculty Fellowship, received the American Association of Teachers of Italian's Distinguished Service Award, and held executive positions in national associations for both Italian Studies for Foreign Language Program Direction.
